## \* Over 2's Programme — Pop Culture \*

Our current programme, Pop Culture, and exploring the concept of community and the collective through the medium of super hero/fantasy play has now finished.

The children really enjoyed this particular interest and learnt a lot

from exploring a variety of different concepts throughout the programme, from identities, social rules, baddies and goodies, to working as a team. The children also learnt more about what real life super heroes do within our community, such as the Police, to the Ambulance service, and the Fire service. The children also ex-

### \* Koru Group \*

Some parents have asked about what 'Koru group' is, as their children approach their 4th birthday. As part of our programme at Bright Star, the 4 to 5 year olds have investigation time every day

from 12:00 till about 12:30. This is a time where they can explore their interests in more depth and carry out activities related to the current programme. Over the past month, the Koru group children have not only been exploring our programme in more depth, but also learning more about



Matariki, Maori New Year. They have participated in a range of activities relating to Matariki.

Koru group time is also a time to learn more about the transition to school. We also have lunch box day for the Koru group every Friday, which is another type of school preparation for the 4 to 5 year old children. We also talk about what happens at school, and the children who do school visits often feedback to this group about what they experience at school visits.

#### \* Matariki \*

In June/July we had a variety of activities that took place at Bright Star and in our community in order to help us all celebrate **Māori** New Year.

Samin along with Rei, Masyn's dad, and some of the children painted a beautiful mural in our outdoor play area. It is an illustration of the story of Ranginui and Papatuanuku, and some of their sons such as Tane - God of the Forrest.

Some of us went to Te Papa to experience their Matariki exhibition, and some of us went to the Newlands Community Centre for a Matariki story time where the children learnt songs, listened to stories, and played games. Also, we would like to say a big thank-you to all the parents who brought in vegetable/s for the soup that the teachers and the children made together for Matariki celebrations. It was delicious and a great incentive for almost all our tamariki to eat their vegetables!

During these Matariki celebrations and activities, the children's interest in Māori mythology increased, and this led the teachers to offer more activities around this topic. We have been reading stories such as How the Kiwi Lost it's Wings, How Maui Slowed the Sun, In the Beginning, and much more. The

of the vegetables. Most of them loved it and they enjoyed eating it. Very few of the children disliked the different tastes, however it was still a valuable and good opportunity for them to try something new.
