Over 2's Programme — The Animal Kingdom

We started our 'Animal Kingdom' programme at the beginning of the year. It is rewarding to see so many of the children continue to show a keen interest in learning about animals.

As a teaching team, we have facilitated a programme that attends to our

at an individual and group level. The toddlers have been able to expand their vocabulary through storytelling and participating in puppet shows. This helps to support their imaginary play, social interactions and relationships. The older children have been engaging in dramatic play with animal themes. We have seen this play become more and more complex, allowing the children to negotiate

tamariki's learning needs and goals, both

social rules and develop social skills. The children have also developed their fine motor skills through hands-on activities such as craft making.

Our programme covered different curriculum areas, and topics such as farm animals, zoo animals, ocean animals, jungle animals and pets. We have explored concepts such as herbivores and carnivores, endangered animals, and

so on. The Koru group children were also able to learn about scientific concepts through investigation, using the internet, books, experiments and excursions. They have learned different methods of making inquiries and discoveries.

The children enjoyed many excursions as part of the programme. At Wellington Zoo, they were astounded

to see wild animals, up close and in real life. During our trip to Te Papa, the **children discovered information about New Zealand's native animals that live** in the mountains, forests and sea. A teacher brought her chickens to the Centre for the children to learn about. The children also visited the local supermarket to learn about different farm animal products.

gramme! We also had parents bring in insects for the children to observe. Maira's family shared home stories for our programme board. Cole's parents took him to visit a farm in Ohariu Valley, which extended Cole's interest in farm animals. We also had family members and whānau accompany us on our trips to the zoo and Te Papa.

* Matariki Celebration *

Matariki is the Māori name for the cluster of stars also known as the Pleiades. It rises in midwinter - late May or early June. For many Māori, it heralds the start of a new year also a time of harvesting and sharing food together. Here at Bright Star we have been celebrating it by learning all about the constellation, what it means to us and to others. We have all contributed, created and shared a meal of vegetable soup together with our fam-

ilies and learnt all about the vegetable. Learning about hangi was also a big component of the curriculum as this is traditionally how Māori people cooked their food for celebrations such as this. We carried out some traditional art making activities such as manu tukutuku (kites) and porotiti (hand instrument). We also went on trips to Te Papa as well as

Newlands Community Centre to hear more stories and songs about the Māori culture to extend our own knowledge. These activities have helped us all to gain more knowledge of the indigenous culture of Aotearoa. It is also a time to remind us to celebrate the important things in life like, whānau and kai and to remember all of those people that made it possible for us to be living together in Aotearoa.

* Self-review *

The first self-review we completed this year was on 'Authentic Interactions' with the children. The results of this review have given us some great pointers and next steps to consider in our practice, such as reviewing our centre philosophy, using the teacher's council registration criteria for us to reflect on our practice, continuing to be strong in our team approach when interacting with the children, implementing the RI E philosophy even more, and so on.

The second self-review topic we are currently reviewing is considering to what extent we implement Māori Tikanga values in our programme planning. Melanie will be sharing the results of this selfreview in early July via email. Our next self-review topic will be literacy and numeracy in our early childhood setting.
