<u>* Tuí & Koru Group's Programme ~</u> <u>Exploring Dinosaur *</u>

A few months ago, our kaiako noticed that some tamariki have begun to incorporate miniature dinosaurs into their play. This was an extension of the previous interest in science and the general interest in animals at the time.

The teachers noticed that some tamariki were allocating each dinosaur to be the father, daughter and sister etc. Other tamariki were walking around with the miniature dinosaurs and making different sounds with them. Some tamariki have been matching the pairs of dinosaurs, exploring the early mathematical concept of pattern. Children were not only exploring role play with the dinosaurs, but talking about how they became extinct. The team recorded some of the dialogue, revealing some of their fascinating theories. Toby said, "It's because of the meteor that hit the earth." Ico said, "There were volcano explosions and dinosaurs got killed and buried by the lava." To extend tamariki's interest and knowledge, our

Throughout the programme, the children gained new knowledge about dinosaurs. We saw and heard tamariki discussing and debating infor-

It has been exciting for the kaiako to learn more about dinosaurs alongside the tamariki and we will continue to observe where this interest moves to next.
